

## **Essex Flood Guide**

A guide to localised, non emergency flooding issues

### Introduction

Understanding the various responsibilities related to flooding can be difficult and complicated.

This document has been produced as a quick guide to explain the role of different authorities within the water management sector. The document will enable you to quickly find out who to contact first depending on your type of flood or drainage issues.

Private home and landowners also have certain responsibilities too. In cases where multiple organisations need to be involved, we will work together.

## Flooding from rainfall, groundwater and watercourses

The County Council / Unitary Authorities are known as the Lead Local Flood Authorities (LLFAs) and have a role in overseeing the management of risks from rainfall or surface water, groundwater, piped or open smaller streams and ditches (known as ordinary watercourses).

When flood incidents are reported to a LLFA they will make an assessment whether to carry out a detailed flood investigation under Section 19 of the Flood and Water Management Act 2010.

It is an LLFAs role to review applications for consent to pipe, infill or make any other changes to smaller streams and ditches. Powers under the Land Drainage Act 1991 enable LLFAs to enforce removal of unconsented works and watercourse maintenance where necessary.

LLFAs also have a role in providing comments on the surface water drainage plans for major developments seeking planning permission.

## Flooding from highway and impassable roads

Essex Highways is responsible for maintaining roads and pavements in Essex (excluding Southend and Thurrock).

It operates a routine maintenance programme for cleaning drains, alongside reactive maintenance to resolve issues such as drainage blockages and other minor drainage issues that are reported.

If Essex Highways receive a report of an impassable road due to flooding, the road will be assessed, and if deemed necessary the road will be closed.

Residents can use Essex Highways online reporting tool to report issues with road drainage such as blocked gullies.

Essex Highways only deals with surface water drainage on the roads and pavements on the publicly maintainable highway.

Southend-on-Sea City Council and Thurrock Council have their own highways departments. Any highways concerns in these areas should be reported to them.





## Flooding from main rivers, reservoirs, estuaries and sea

The Environment Agency manages flood risks from main rivers, reservoirs, estuaries, and the sea. They also maintain main rivers and their flood defences.

Maintenance can include:

- grass cutting and weed control
- removing obstructions from rivers
- repairing and operating sluice gates and pumping stations

They provide a 24-hour Floodline where you can listen to recorded flood warning information for your area or speak to an operator for advice and information.

To report flooding from a main river or the sea, contact the Environment Agency 24 hour Floodline **0345 988 1188**.

A main river is a watercourse marked on a main river map, including any structure or device for controlling its flow – <u>Statutory Main River Map</u>

# Flooding from sewers and fresh water supply

## Thames Water, Anglian Water, Affinity Water and Essex and Suffolk Water

Wastewater companies are responsible for the removal and treatment of foul or combined (foul and surface water) wastewater across Essex.

In Essex Thames Water and Anglian Water have a responsibility for the removal of wastewater, this includes foul and surface water (rainfall).

Unusual heavy rainfall can overwhelm their system and cause flooding. Groundwater can also ingress into some systems and adds pressure to the volume of flow.

Thames Water, Anglian Water, Affinity Water and Essex **and** Suffolk Water provide fresh water supply to residents across Essex. Fresh water leaks are often more noticeable during times of drier weather.

### **Private Landowner**

If an ordinary watercourse (small stream or ditch) borders or passes through your property you are a **riparian owner** and will have a legal responsibility to maintain any watercourses running over your property.

Homeowners are also responsible for all aspects of their private sewage treatment plants, septic tanks, and cesspits.

In the event of a major flooding incident local authorities coordinate with emergency planning and emergency services to aid in the evacuation of people from their homes where necessary.

Local councils do not have a legal obligation to store and provide the public with sandbags. If your property is susceptible to flooding, you can protect your property using a variety of flood products.

In certain circumstances you may be eligible for a **'Property Flood Resilience' grant** from Essex County Council. The grant funds the installation of flood protection measures such as flood doors and air brick covers, which reduce the impact of future flooding to your home (as pictured below).
